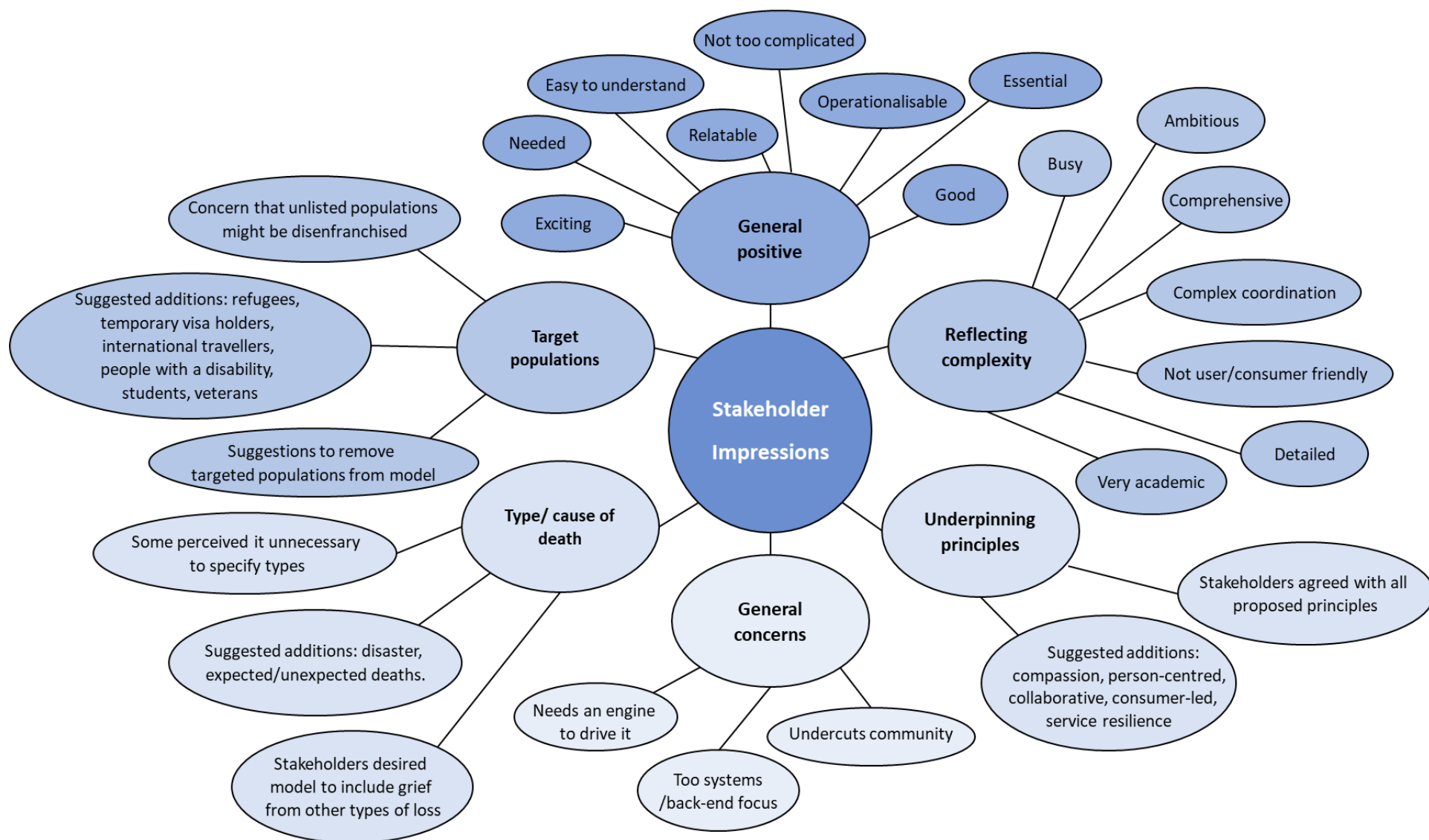

	Changes made to the model post-workshop
General clarifications	• Clarifications to the context, purpose, use and scope of the model. • Clarifications about the interface between information and navigation support provision and emotional grief support provision.
Changes to the main model diagram	Additions to the content of the outer boxes: • Compassionate care added to the underpinning principles. • Disaster added as a unique type of death/grief. • Disability added as a population with potentially unique grief support needs. Modifications were made to the visual elements of the diagram to assist in readability: • Colours updated. • Text changed to make additive nature of supports more apparent.
Changes to categories and components	• Public promotion of statewide service as removed as a category and its components added to Access Pathways (i.e. six categories condensed to five). • Capacity building added more clearly to Grief Education. • Peak Bodies explicitly added to the formal partnerships component.
