Sample size	No sample size calculation was determined. Sample sizes in each round of experiment were limited by the number of sequences and by resources such as incubator space. Typically samples were tested in duplicate or triplicate, where cultures derived from separate, individual colonies.

Replication	Data are presented as mean value and standard deviations of three independent biological replicates. The absorber coupling fed-batch fermentation experiments were performed twice. All attempts showed in this study were successful.
Randomization	For in vivo experiments, 3 individual colonies were picked randomly from the agar plates. In collection of GC and HPLC data the order of the samples was randomized.
Blinding	Blinding does not apply to our experiments for several reasons. We rationally designed the experiments to achieve our goal. we need to know the performance of each engineered strains. The samples of bacterial cultures were random sampling. The experiments did not involve any animals or human participants and the analysis was carried out entirely on bacteria.
