Since the manuscript contains a multitude of mostly technical experiments, an n number of 3 was generally chosen and showed significant

differences upon Student t testing or Mann-Whitney testing, due to high measurement reproducibility. No highly complex biological systems, like animals were used, that would require higher n numbers due to strong biological variability.

Data exclusions	For Figure 3A, for the 110cm column for input amounts 10ng and 50ng one data point each was excluded. These single measurements show substantially different number of identifications and outlier testing based on the Grubb's method ($\alpha=0.1$) confirmed these single values to be outliers.
Replication	The claimed benefits of the presented novel analytical workflow over a classical, data dependent acquisition workflow is demonstrated multiple times and technical reproducibility was found to be excellent. Longitudinal variations in mass spectrometer performance, LC characteristics and spray emitter performance over time, mandated grouped mass spec analyses of the samples to be compared to each other, which is a general pitfall in label-free proteomic applications. Hence, in general the presented technical experiments were carried out once.
Randomization	Randomization during sample measurement was implemented.
Blinding	Due to the main focus of the study on technical methodology, samples blinding was not deemed necessary and accordingly not implemented.
