All analyses were performed on post-mortem, deidentified molecular data. This study was focused on identifying molecular networks associated with Alzheimer's disease. Sex was included as a covariate for most analyses and explicitly considered when examining whether CD83(+) microglia are sex-associated.

This study is based on post-mortem, deidentified molecular data generated from biosamples collected by several large clinicopathological studies of ageing and Alzheimer's disease. Participant's self-reported race was used as a covariate in relevant analyses, however these cohorts are predominantly comprised of caucasian individuals, so we did not perform any race-stratified analyses.
