Data collection	We gathered publicly accessible single cell RNA-seq and bulk RNA-seq data, from which we generated synthetic bulk RNA-seq data. Details of all the data utilized for evaluation are available in Supplementary Table S3. The procedure for generating synthetic bulk RNA-seq data is outlined in the Supplementary Information section of the manuscript.
Data analysis	We conducted a comparative analysis of our ReDeconv model with three other cell type deconvolution models, namely CIBERSORTx, BayesPrism, and MuSiC, using both synthetic and real bulk RNA-seq data. All these programs are publicly accessible and can be located in their respective referenced publications. CIBERSORTx[https://cibersortx.stanford.edu/index.php]: a web portal for cell type deconvolution and expression profile purification of bulk RNA-seq data. MuSiC[https://github.com/xuranw/MuSiC]: a deconvolution method that utilizes scRNA-seq data of multiple subjects to estimate cell type percentage of bulk RNA-seq data. BayesPrism [https://github.com/Danko-Lab/BayesPrism]: deconvolution method that uses scRNA-seq data as reference to find percentages of cell types in bulkRNA-seq data. ReDeconv [https://github.com/jyyulab/redeconv]: a new method for cel type deconvolution that addresses critical issues overlooked by current existing methods.
