Study protocol

Data collection

Patients were recruited between August 2017 and July 2019. The correlative work completion followed completed enrollment of the clinical trial.

Outcomes

- Phase I: To evaluate the safety of atezolizumab in combination with radiation and temozolomide during the concurrent stage and in combination with temozolomide during the adjuvant stage.

- Phase II: To evaluate the overall survival (OS) of atezolizumab in combination with radiation and temozolomide and in combination with temozolomide at onset of treatment.

The primary endpoint is overall survival (OS). We will estimate the OS distribution using the Kaplan-Meier method. The historical median for similar patients is about 15 months. If we successfully extend this by 6 months to 21 months, then we would need at least 9 months of post-accrual follow-up to reliably estimate the median OS. If the median OS is 21 months, with 60 patients accrued at the rate of 2.5 per month and with all patients followed for an additional 9 months after accrual, computer simulations indicate that we would expect to observe about 30 deaths and 95% confidence intervals for the median OS would have a lower half-width of about 6 months. In addition, we can estimate the 1-year OS probability at about 67% with a 95% confidence interval with lower half-width of 11%.

In case the combination turns out to be more toxic than expected we will use Bayesian methods (Thall, 2005) to monitor the toxicity rate continuously (stopping if the probability that the 10-week DLT rate > 30% gets unacceptably high) and in case the combination turns out to be less effective than expected we will use Bayesian methods (Thall, 2005) to monitor OS continuously (stopping if the probability that the median survival is greater than 21 months gets unacceptably low).
