Life sciences study design

Sample size	Multiple datasets. Sample size is described per dataset in the "Datasets used" section of the paper. The complete combinatorial dataset is 257,165 samples from experimental and computationally generated protein structures.
Data exclusions	Any non-standard amino acid residues are encoded as a unknown residue in the neural network. We removed all HETATM records from the experimental PDBs. We also removed all DNA and RNA atoms.
Replication	We use PyTorch to model the neural networks. Completely reproducible results are not guaranteed across PyTorch releases, individual commits, or different platforms. We however do set a seed to control the random number generators across the software.
Randomization	Samples are divided over train,ing validation and test sets. We utilize two splits described in the paper. The temporal split is divided by publication date for the protein structure. For the fold split ,we determine the sequence identity between samples using MMSeqs. For each enzyme classification we order the resulting clusters by size. We pick the largest possible clusters to populate the test set until we reach the desired split threshold and repeat this for the validation set. In this case 10% of the data are used for the test set, 10% for the validation set, and the rest is added to the training set.
Blinding	A full blind study is not possible. To prevent data leakage, we tested on benchmark datasets, removing any structures with more than 30% sequence identity to the training database. Furthermore, we can only test enzyme classifications inside the training dataspace.
