Data collection	No commercial, custom or open source code was used during data collection. Samples were processed either for plasma proteomics (Olink proteomics), mass cytometry (Teiko) or RNA-sequencing (sequencing performed by Illumina sequencing).
Data analysis	The stats (v4.3.2), survival (v3.7.0), and lme4 (v1.1.35.5) packages were used in R. The gseapy (v1.1.3), scipy (v1.10.1), scanpy (v1.9.8), cellphonedb (v5.0.0), COMMOT (v0.0.3), qnorm (v0.8.1) were used in Python. Cellranger (v7.0.0) and RNA-SeQC (v1.2) were used.

Sample size	Samples were chosen by availability of melanoma anti-PD1 treated samples in our melanoma biobank at MGH. We proceeded with as many samples that were available with two timepoints, baseline and 6 weeks, at the time we had to send samples for their respective analyses
Data exclusions	Three patients had best overall responses of "Not evaluable" and were excluded from analysis.
Replication	Since these were human samples across 250 patients, each patient serves as a replicate for the analyses at each timepoint. Importantly, within the Olink proteomics panels, several proteins were assayed multiple times and served as technical replicates. These technical replicates were highly concordant.
Randomization	No randomization was performed.
Blinding	No blinding was performed.
