Sample size

Sample size was predetermined due to this study using data collected by the systematic GLORIA monitoring scheme. Sample size therefore depended on the number of vegetation plots surveyed by GLORIA since 2001. 724 vegetation plots could be analyzed in this study as these were the plots for which we had complete lists of the taxa occurring in them, as well as sufficient temperature logger data (spanning at least 10 years). One analyses (the one also considering non-climatic covariables as predictors for thermophilization rates) was restricted to 720 plots, as one of the covariable could not be calculated for four of the plots. We consider 724 (or 720) plots surveyed for more than 20 years each and spread across Europe a sufficient sample, in terms of sample size, as well as temporal and spatial coverage. Across such a large temporal and spatial extent, this sample size should be sufficient to reveal temperature change effects on vegetation.

Data exclusions

Data for specific vegetation plots were excluded if the corresponding soil-temperature data loggers did not provide a sufficiently long temperature time series. As sufficient we considered a temperature time series spanning at least 10 years. Reasons for insufficient temperature time series: logger surfacing or malfunctioning.

The only aspect where blinding would have been relevant was the visual estimation of the individual plant species' percentage covers in the vegetation plots; however, the GLORIA monitoring scheme does not consider blinding for cover estimation.
