Data collection	Photographs of IVPP V33259 and V33260 under normal light were taken using a Nikon D850 Camera. Laser stimulated fluorescence photographing were taken using a 500 milliwatt 450 nanometer blue laser (MDL-III-450-1W, Changchun New Industries Optoelectronics Tech. co., Ltd), with a LP-500-62 light yellow longpass filter and a Nikon D850.
Data analysis	Maximum parsimony analyses were performed using the TNT software package (v.1.5). Bayesian tip-dating analysis was conducted using MrBayes (V. 3.2.7b). Phylogenetic comparative analyses were conducted using the R v 4.0.3. The following R packages are used in this study: paleotree (v. 3.4.4), Claddis (v0.6.3), geomorph (v. 3.1.2), Morpho(v.2.12). Geometric morphometric analyses were conducted using the tpsDIG (v. 2.1). Ancestral character state reconstruction of the pygostyle was performed using the Mesquite (v.3.61).
