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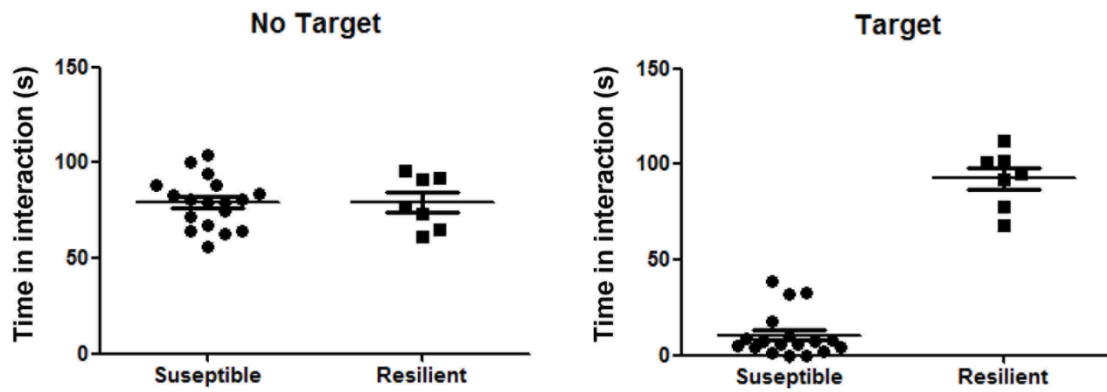


Figure S1. The social interaction test (SIT) after CSDS.

In the SIT (no target), there was no changes both groups. In the SIT (target), we divided the susceptible mice ($n = 18$) and resilient mice ($n = 7$) by the evaluation of the time of mice in the interaction area. Subsequently, the susceptible mice ($n = 18$) were randomly divided into three groups (saline, (*R*)-ketamine, lanicemine).
