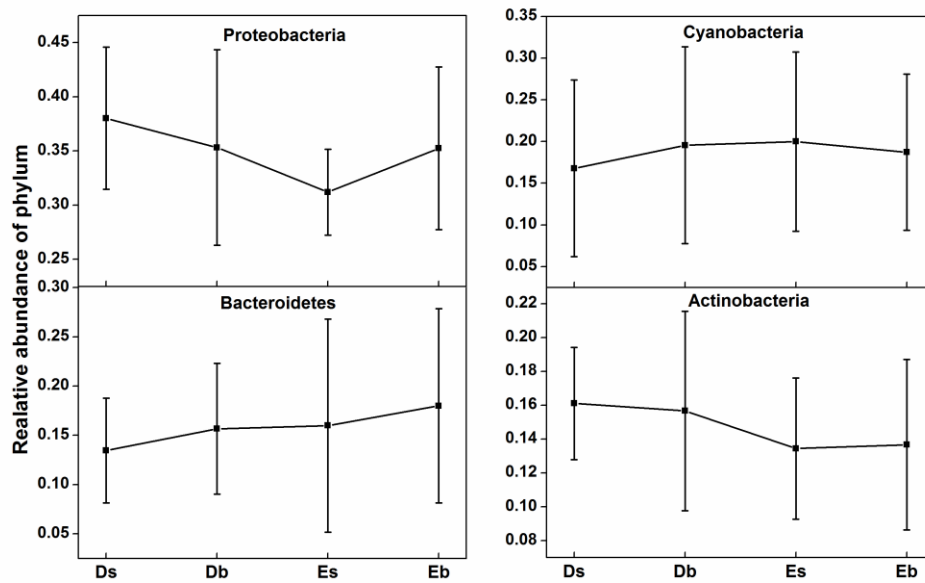


Bacterial abundance and diversity in pond water supplied with different feeds
