Introduction:		Introduction to the project, including clarification that we will not discuss the actual medical treatment of the deceased. Presentation of either A.S.S.K., C.L.J., or M.H.L. Obtain informed consent and provide information about anonymization and the use of data in the article and the recording. Consent can be withdrawn at any time.	Completion of the consent form. Leave contact information in case of a wish to withdraw consent or request a bereavement conversation.
	<i>Psychological screening</i>	How have you been since the experience? Who have you talked to about the experience?	
Out-of-hospital cardiac arrest	<i>The participant's account of the course of events</i>	If we go back to that day, can you tell us what happened? What happened when the ambulance arrived?	Who was present? What happened? When did it happen? What led up to it, etc.? What was your role when the responders and doctors arrived?
	<i>Citizen Responers</i>	Were any citizen responders present?	If yes: Was it someone you knew? – What was that like? What did the volunteer first responders do after the ambulance personnel took over the treatment? Depending on the response, you can follow up with: – Was that good or bad?

	<i>The resuscitation attempt</i>	How long did the resuscitation attempt last? Where were you, and what was your role? Did you have any contact with the doctor and/or the citizen responders?	If the relative was not in the room, what were they doing? How did you experience the contact? Was it verbal and/or physical?
Collaboration and communication with prehospital personnel	<i>Communication during the resuscitation attempt</i>	How did the healthcare professionals interact with you? Were you given updates on the resuscitation attempt? How were you involved? Were you given a warning before they stopped the CPR? Were you given the opportunity to "say goodbye" or hold their hand before the CPR was stopped? How were you informed that your loved one had passed away? Could this have been communicated differently	How was it?
	<i>Information for relatives</i>	Once death had occurred, did you feel well informed about what was going to happen next?	Were there any pieces of information you felt you were missing? Were you able to receive and process information? What information were you left with?
	<i>Regarding the folder left for the relatives,</i>	Was the information in the folder usefull?	Was there anything missing from the leaflet?

	<i>by the prehospital personnel</i>		Did you need more or different information besides what was in the leaflet?
Overall experience of the prehospital personnels actions	<i>Regarding the personnel</i>	Could you have used more support from the healthcare professionals than what you received? What could the staff have done differently? Any suggestions?	And if so, what? Was there anything particularly good or bad that the doctor or the lifesavers did?
After the prehospital personell leave the relatives	<i>Bereavement conversation</i>	Have you or any other relatives you know of felt a need for a follow-up conversation or review of the event with the ambulance doctor?	
	<i>Follow-up</i>	In the time afterwards, how has your experience been with the support offered by the healthcare system?	What measures would have helped in your situation? What kind of support have you received? How has it helped you?
	<i>Closing</i>	Are there any other topics you would like to talk about that we haven't covered? Is there anything in the whole process that you think could have been done differently?
